Dear Michel Dubois,

I have the great fortune to inform you that, after my success in first instance and in Appeal, the Court of Cassation (France's Supreme Court) has just confirmed to me our victory in the plagiarism case against Brisson and Jeantet.

At the Commercial Court of Lyon, as long as the attorneys deliberated against each other, everything proceeded without any sign of my case being strengthened. But, suddenly, once my book was exhibited to the judges, it was like a bomb that definitively changed the course of things, both at the first hearing and during the ensuing Appeal.

The evidence that, legally, my ownership is stronger than a State-granted title could never be questioned by the opponent, from the first hearing until the splendid conclusion at the Court of Cassation which, by its Judgment of July 4, 2006, made your Intellectual Passport's first jurisprudence.

PS: The French Court of Cassation (*Judgment of July 4, 2006 – Ref N: 05/4797 DCI*) confirmed the Court of Appeal of Lyon's judgment (*Judgment of May 27, 2004 – R.G. 03/06633*) which had invalidated for lack of novelty model N° **974631** registered by the INPI (France's National Institute of Industrial Property) on July 31, 1997, in favor of my copyright and resulting royalties on my book entitled "Changing the city" (plagiarism concerned strictly page 129 out of **380** pages).
